

## Breastfeeding Support Group is a Welcome Resource For Moms

The Birth Center was very fortunate to receive a two year grant from the PA Department of Health to start a Breastfeeding Support Group. Every other Thursday morning new moms and their babies crowd into our

classroom to love and support each other while breastfeeding. TBC has a 99.8% rate of breast feeding initiation compared to a 75% initiation rate in the general public. Our research statistics show that 60% of

our clientele are still totally breast-feeding when the baby is six months old, compared to less than 25% in the general public. We hope to help increase the benefits achieved by breastfeeding in the general public by offering this safe place for breastfeeding moms to come together and support each other. This can be particularly helpful during the sometimes difficult period of the first few weeks of nursing a baby.

It is amazing to see a new mom, whose baby is just a couple of weeks old, come to the group, tell her story - many times with tears running down her cheeks - and the rest of women rally around her with hugs, saying "yes that happened to me too", give suggestions of what seems to work, and telling her to "hang in there, this too shall pass". The women are very respectful of each other, listen, and offer

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## Well-Woman Health - Gardasil Vaccine

Gardasil is a new vaccine that helps protect women against diseases caused by Human Papillomavirus (HPV). HPV is a common virus. In 2005 the Center for Disease Control (CDC) estimated that 20 million people in the United States had the virus. There are many different types of HPV; some cause no harm. Others can cause diseases of the genital areas. For most people the virus goes away on its own. When the virus does not go away, it can develop into cervical cancer, precancerous lesions, or genital warts, depending on the

HPV type. It has been estimated by the CDC that at least 50% of sexually active people become infected with HPV during their lifetime. A male or female of any age who takes part in any kind of sexual activity that involves genital contact is at risk. Many people who have HPV may not show any signs or symptoms. This means they can pass on the virus to others and not know it.

By getting the vaccine Gardasil, diseases such as cervical cancer, abnormal and precancerous cervical lesions, abnormal and pre-

cancerous vaginal lesions, abnormal and precancerous vulvar lesions, and genital warts may be prevented. This vaccine does not cure, but helps to prevent these diseases. Gardasil is approved for girls and women ages 9 through 26. This vaccine is given as an injection. Ideally the doses are given in the following sequence. First dose: at a date you and your midwife choose. Second dose: 2 months after the first dose. Third dose: 6 months after the first dose. Anyone who is allergic to any of the ingredients in the vaccine or has an al-

## Birth Story by Jessica Lim

I was due Oct. 9, 2006. When I woke up on Mon. Oct. 2, I started having mild cramps that felt a little like menstrual cramps. I took a two hour nap that afternoon, anticipating a possible long night, especially since I hadn't slept well the night before. That was a life saver. By the time I picked up Paul at work that night, the cramps were swelling into peaks about every 15-20 minutes. I took a long, warm shower to help me relax. However, when we went to bed, I had to sit up every 10 minutes to cope with the swelling of the contractions. There was no chance I could sleep.

I did the deep relaxation breathing we had learned in class. It was hard, though not painful... not quite what I expected labor to feel like. I spent a lot of time walking-up and down the hallway, in front of the couch, or just from side to side. Later, I took a warm bath and suddenly I was overcome with exhaustion, and I managed to fall asleep on the couch for about an hour. I woke up around 6 am.

I was feeling hungry and decided to have some cereal. The contractions were starting to get harder, so I woke up Paul. After one bite of cereal, I started feeling nauseous. With the next contraction, I threw up and then called TBC. Betsy called back a few minutes later and said to head in to The Birth Center.

When we arrived, Denise met us at the door to the birth suites.

She examined me and said, "Are you ready for some really good news? You're already 100% effaced and 6 cm dilated. The hardest work is done." I was so relieved. It

was at that moment that I knew I would be able to birth my baby naturally. They started to fill the

bathtub and I just rested on the bed.

I spent the next two hours in the tub. With each contraction, I would sit up, and Paul would hold my hand. I knew that with 10-12 deep breaths, the contraction would be over. That made it easier to deal with each one as it came. I would lie back when it was over. Every 15 minutes either Holly or Jen, the RN, would come and check the baby's heartbeat. They were amazed at how well I was doing, and that after each contraction I would smile. The contractions were hard, but not unbearable, and not really painful. Just hard.

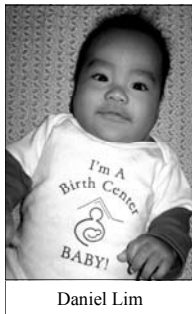
Soon I was told I could push when I felt like it. So I pushed. And pushed and pushed. I looked at the clock and kept thinking I would have my baby by 1 pm. 1 pm came and went. I was still pushing.

And still I pushed. They piled up a bunch of pillows behind me where I would lie until the urge to push was overwhelming. I would sit up, pull back my legs and give four hard pushes. I always wanted to stop after the third, but Denise would encourage me through one more. Then I would collapse back onto the pillows in a sweaty heap, and Paul would fan me, wipe the sweat off my face, and encourage me to drink.

I was amazed at Paul. He was so tender and attentive. He had said

he didn't want to watch, however, I noticed he kept looking between my legs, especially once the baby's head was visible. He had a sense of amazement and wonder. The midwife even held up a mirror so he could see while he held my hand. I told him that I wanted him to cut the baby's cord. He didn't seem to mind.

I asked how much longer it would be, how many pushes left. Denise said "soon." Denise started doing some perineal massage and put some St. John's Wort oil on me to help. Once his head started showing, the midwives kept saying "Look at all that dark hair!" As she massaged around his head, he would kick me. After pushing some more, Denise realized that I had a vaginal band that the baby was hitting his head on, and that kept pushing him back. She stretched it out and that helped a lot. At one point, Denise took my hand, and I touched the wet hair of the little head still inside my body. That gave me the energy I needed to finish birthing my baby.

Finally, fed up with pushing, I sat up with one contraction, saying "OK baby, you're coming out now!" He didn't. Denise was chanting, "Birth your baby! Birth your baby!" Denise told me to put my

hand between my legs so I could help bring him up to my chest. I think I got more in the way than I helped, but it helped to make me feel even more active in my birth.

He came out crying- a wet wriggling dark mass of hair and long legs. Denise held him up and I gasped, "It's a boy!" They put him straight to my chest where I held him close- our little Daniel Tomas. Daniel was perfect. He was beautiful. I have never seen anything so beautiful in my life. He had long tiny fingers, dark almond shaped eyes, and a full head of dark hair. I couldn't believe I was finally holding my baby!

Daniel was born at 2:32 p.m. on October 3<sup>rd</sup> weighing 7 lbs. 6.8 oz. He was 20 ½ inches long. We had a very positive birth experience and are very appreciative of all the loving support from the Birth Center staff.

## WELL-WOMAN HEALTH Gardasil Vaccine

lergic reaction after getting a dose of the vaccine should not receive it. The most commonly reported side effects include: pain, swelling, itching, and redness at the injection site; fever; nausea; and dizziness.

This vaccine does not substitute for routine cervical cancer screening. Anyone receiving the vaccine should continue cervical cancer screening. As with any vaccine, Gardasil may not fully protect everyone who gets the vaccine. Gardasil will not protect against diseases due to non-vaccine HPV types. There are more than 100 HPV types; Gardasil helps protect against 4 of the types most likely to cause cervical cancer (types 6, 11, 16, and 18).

You and your midwife can discuss whether or not you should receive this vaccine. If you decide to get the vaccine, make sure that all three doses are received on the desired schedule, as this allows for you to get the full benefits of Gardasil. We understand that many insurers are covering this vaccine but please check with your insurer to be certain.

New friends are made and babies are seen growing, developing, and smiling while continuing to be fed by their mothers' milk!

# TBC Education Programs and Support

## Preparation For Childbirth

A five-week, 15-hour course for first-time mothers and their partners covering the anatomy and physiology of labor and birth, natural pain coping strategies, unexpected outcomes and birth technology, postpartum and newborn care. Classes include mindfulness exercises, focused breathing, relaxation techniques, movement for labor, and partner support skills. Birth videos will be shown. Tuesdays or Wednesdays, 7:00-9:30 p.m. \$200 registration fee includes *Focus on Breastfeeding* class.

## Focus On Breastfeeding

One-session class offering detailed information on breastfeeding. Proper latch, positioning, nutrition, bonding and related issues are covered. Designed for *both* mother and partner (two can remember more than one!). Mondays or Thursdays, 7:00-9:30 p.m. \$50 per couple if not taken as part of *Preparation for Childbirth*.

## Childbirth Prep. Supplement

A one-session 2 hour class for first-time mothers and their partners who have taken childbirth preparations outside of TBC. Covers TBC protocols and policies, the roles of nurses and midwives, hospital care if needed and postpartum care. Scheduled on an as-needed basis. \$50 per couple.

## Childbirth Refresher

A one-session class for parents who have previously given birth but want to refresh their memory and learn some new approaches. Includes an overview of labor and delivery, coping techniques, the role of nurses and midwives, TBC policies, hospital transfer if necessary, and your postpartum stay. Mondays or Thursdays, 7:00-9:30 p.m. \$50 per couple.

## Prenatal Yoga

Classes combine safe and gentle yoga stretches with relaxation and bonding exercises to prepare the body, mind and spirit for childbirth. Held in Bryn Mawr Hospital's Clothier Building Living Room Thursdays 7:00-8:15 p.m. Bring a mat or towel. \$60 for 6 week series. ## Pregnancy Loss Counseling

Led by **Lydia Prass, MS**. Held as needed at no charge. Call Lydia at 610-527-6116 to register.

## Sibling Preparation Class (2-6 year olds)

This one-session class focuses on interaction between parent and child. Class activities lead toward discussion of what it's like being a big sister or big brother, what a new baby is like, and what happens when a new baby enters the family. Circle times reinforce these concepts. A birth video is *not* shown. (If you want video, note on the registration form.) Held one Saturday every month. \$50 registration fee includes activity book for first child; add \$10 for each additional child.

## Sibling & Birth Preparation Class (7-13 year olds)

This one-session class includes discussion of the birth process, characteristics of and caring for babies, and what happens in families when new babies join them. The discussion is augmented with pictures and activities. A birth video *will* be shown. (If you do not want this, note on the registration form.) Held one Saturday every other month. \$50 registration fee includes activity book for first child; add \$10 for each additional child.

## Teen Sibling Class (14 and older)

This expectant sibling class follows a discussion format, and is augmented by pictures and informational activities. More advanced discussion of birth, infant care and family dynamics is facilitated. Geared towards answering questions teens may have approaching the birth of a new sibling. A parent should attend with child. Scheduled as needed. \$50 registration fee.

## Infant Massage

For infants 3 weeks to crawling. Learn step by step techniques which help infants learn to relax in response to healthy touch. No additional charge for dads or other family members. \$50 for 3 sessions includes handouts.
